The Parish Council met in Upwood Village Hall on Monday 7th January 2019.

Casual Vacancy – 2 vacancies for parish councillors have arisen. Please see village website www.upwood.org or contact the Parish Clerk parishclerk@upwood.org

County & District Council Reports: The county and district councillors were asked for clarification on the allocation of funds from ‘Ramsey Windfarm Community Benefit Fund’. One bid submitted by a community group in Upwood and the Raveleys was unsuccessful. The chairman asked Councillor Rogers to investigate how funds appear to have been allocated in 2018 and to ensure that funds are allocated in accordance with the rules in future.

Matters Arising – The Cross Keys Pub: The pub is currently closed. The chairman met with the owner last month and has agreed to delay the re-registration of the pub as an ‘asset of community value’ in order to enable the pub owner to pursue the sale or re-tenanting routes currently under consideration.

Finance - Accounts for the past month were approved.

Traffic, Highways & Road Safety - Parish Speed Indicator Device (SID). The parish council has taken receipt of the speed indicator device and Councillor Slater has resolved several issues regarding missing parts and software compatibility. The SID is now in use. The device will be moved between eleven locations within the parish. The application to the Local Highways Initiative (LHI) for traffic calming in Great Raveley was submitted last month. LHI decision will be known shortly.

Parish Maintenance – After taking up references a new parish maintenance contractor was selected and has been awarded the contract for the next 3 years.

Councillor Portfolio Reports - Councillor Perkins expressed concerns over the increasing number and size of potholes in the local area. Councillor Slater confirmed that a pothole is defined by the county council as being deeper than 40mm and wider than 75mm. The clerk reminded members that potholes and other highway faults may be reported online at: <https://highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk>

The chairman reported that several residents have expressed dissatisfaction with their “high speed” broadband service via the parish Facebook page. The main issue appears to relate to the Open Reach migration between two cabinets. The chairman confirmed that he would be happy to collate a collective response from residents to Cambridgeshire County Council and to the ombudsman. Residents wishing to contribute to this this may post a response on the parish Facebook post or contact the chairman directly at robinhowe@blackfyne.com.

A New Year and a new start! Happy New Year to you all! Have you made a resolution to develop green fingers and learn new skills this year? Perhaps you've decided to shed the Christmas pounds for good or, like me, try to follow the trendy 'Veganuary' for the month! Anyway, no doubt you have decided to become more-healthy and fitter ready for the warmer months of Spring.



In the Community Allotments, there are currently several plots of varying sizes to rent which are reasonably priced too. With the warm sun on your back, fresh air and exercise just think of the joy you will feel as new life begins and your carefully cultivated seedlings develop. Wandering around the allotments this afternoon the weather was comparatively mild but still nipped my un-gloved hands. I observed that several of the vacant plots have been covered with sheeting to prevent weed growth. Many of the occupied plots have been treated to a good covering of surface organic manure and other soil improvers have been added to increase bulk and texture, in preparation for planting.

Sadly, my chard (which I rather neglected) has provided a tasty treat for hungry bunnies; a reminder that everything needs to be covered and protected from birds and animals during the following year! There are some hardy leeks and what appear to be tiny onions growing too. Rhubarb has also started to sprout, but I daresay within a couple of weeks, all growth will come to a halt as the weather forecast predicts a change to much colder conditions for a while. Brrrr! Roll on Spring!

CELEBRATING 100 EDITIONS OF THE PARISH NEWSLETTER

The parish newsletter began its life in September 2002. Although there was a committee of five of us to start with - Frances Ashfield, Geoff Carrington, Deana Hudson, David Paine and myself – it was David who produced and edited the bi-monthly editions almost entirely on his own for the first 10 years before he hung up his pen in 2012. In the early days he would collect all the contributions, produce the proof copy, run off the 550 copies on the Risograph at the Ailwyn School Community Offices, and



then fold and collate them before taking them round to the volunteer distributors.



Since 2012 we have operated with a committee of 8 members which includes a team of 3 editors who edit issues in rotation. Paul Charman, who was an important part of that team for 6 years, decided to stand down last year and his place was taken by Great Raveley resident, Lesley Gee, who has joined the established team of

Judith Harvey and, my better half, Pauline McLeod.

There is a stalwart team of volunteers, co-ordinated by Pam Dowdell (pictured right), who ensure that the newsletter is delivered free of charge to every home in the parish. In fact, there are people from 24 different households involved in one or more aspect of its production and distribution – a real community effort.



Paul & Fran Charman (pictured left) are committee members who undertake the unenviable task of proofreading each edition, often at the eleventh hour, before it is sent to the printers.



Geoff Carrington (pictured right), one the original group which set up the newsletter, acts as treasurer ensuring that the finances are kept in

good order as well as providing us with useful long-term projections in order to keep the publication financially viable.

In 2012 the newsletter was “relaunched” with a new logo, designed by Esther Rowley, a common



format and the inclusion of black & white photographs. More recently we have managed to add 4 pages of colour printing to each edition along with printing on glossy paper which has given the publication a more appealing and professional appearance. The newsletter logo has also been adopted by the parish council as well as used as an identifying motif on both the parish Facebook and Website pages. Current editions, plus an archive of back copies, can be viewed on the parish website, www.upwood.org, with digital copies being sent to people on request.



Nowadays the editions are printed by the excellent local company, Micromac Printers in Ramsey, who always produce the copies of the newsletter on time and with minimal fuss. Many thanks Mac and Tony.

Throughout its existence the newsletter has relied entirely on donations in order to continue publishing. It has undertaken its own fundraising through events such as the village treasure hunt but has been grateful for the generosity of donations from organisations including Upwood Village Fete Committee, Upwood Open Gardens and Village Hall Quiz Nights. Our current financial support comes largely through an annual grant from Upwood & The Raveleys Parish Council as well as from Upwood residents who deliver the Ramsey & Warboys Informer and donate their “earnings” to newsletter funds each month. We were also successful in gaining a grant from The Windfarm Trust in 2015 which allowed us to introduce 4 colour pages into the newsletter.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to the numerous contributors to the newsletter who, over the years, have helped to provide information of local community interest and make this a publication of which the parish can be justifiably proud.
